From the Pastor's desk

As I reflect on this new Advent season, I notice that we often miss Advent's power because these December weeks are full of secular Christmas parties and preparations for Christmas. Each year, the busyness of this season serves to distract us from having an Advent season that truly prepares us for the celebration of Christmas, with all its meaning. There are many ways to enter into this Advent season

One of the best ways to prepare for the very special season of Advent is to "get in touch with ourselves." It may sound odd, but one symptom of our contemporary lives is that we can often be quite "out of touch" (despite computers and cell phones) with what is going on in our very own hearts. We as Catholic Christians, begin our Advent at the same time our Western culture begins Christmas preparations. It is a busy time, and our heads are filled with details to remember. And it is a time of emotional complexity that is part of this holiday season --- with all of the expectations and challenges of relationships and family who we want to be with and who we struggle to be with. But we must turn our hearts back to the ancient tradition of a people longing for the coming of a Savior. We may remember the days of our childhood when we longed for Christmas to come, because it was a magical time of receiving gifts. As adults, we have to ask ourselves: "What is it I long for now?" The answer won't come easily. The more we walk around with that question, and let it penetrate our hearts, the more powerfully we will experience Advent.

During these days of Advent, it is good to reflect on: What is the emptiness I keep trying to "feed" with food, with fantasy, with excitement, and with busyness? What is the conflict that is "eating at me"? What is the sinful, unloving, self-centered pattern for which I haven't asked for forgiveness and healing? Where do I need a peace in my life that the world cannot give?

During Advent, our readings from the Prophet Isaiah, will talk and pray about the expectant hope of Israel. The images we will be using are about darkness and gloom --about thick clouds covering the people --- and about hunger and thirst. They are images that attempt to capture a sense of what we feel when we are distant from our God. There are many images about war and conflict. They express the powerlessness and anxiety we experience when we feel defenseless. Most of all, there are images of a future day --- a day that can only be called the Lord's --- when all the tears will be wiped away, when there will be plenty to eat and drink, and when there will be no more conflict and no more war. When our hearts are open to see that God is our salvation; that God's victory gives us the ultimate security --- then we are ready to begin Advent.
